The purpose of this study is to extend research in the area of racism by looking at the influence of experienced racism on interracial gay male couples. Fourteen interracial gay male couples, recruited from across the United States through phone or e-mail contact, were asked to participate in this survey. I mailed a

questionnaire packet to each partner in the couple. The packet was comprised of two questionnaires, the Index of Race-Related Stress---Brief and the Dyadic Adjustment Scale, which are 5- to 7-point Likert scales. Overall, there was a statistically significant negative correlation between experienced racism and relationship satisfaction, which suggest that these two factors could be related. Specifically, the more a partner experienced racism, the less he perceived his relationship as being satisfactory. This suggests that the degree of stress related to racism by an individual does negatively impact the person's satisfaction felt in the current relationship.

This correlational study attempted to determine if the Outcome Questionnaire can be used to collect the same information as the Revised Dyadic Adjustment scale in marital assessment.

Both measures are common pretreatment assessments and have relational components. The study used secondary data from the Utah State University Marriage and Family Therapy Clinic. Reliability and correlational tests were performed and the results indicate that the assessments measure different constructs. There also were no statistically significant correlations when comparing the measures by gender, marital distress, and marital satisfaction. Implications are discussed including the formulation of new clinical cut-off scores and the importance of using both measures to perform better assessments.
